It's time to give our church some good spring cleaning and attention and we need your help. Saturday, May 18<sup>th</sup> we will be meeting at 9 am are working on:


- •Flower beds will need weeding

### **Being Content Where You Are**

The first time I saw Edith, she was wearing a fuzzy robe and standing on the porch of the humble frame house she shared with her husband. It was a cold December night, and I was part of a church group singing Christmas carols door-to-door. Until then, I had only known Edith's husband, a faithful member of my own congregation. I had not met Edith, who was active in another local church.

A few years after that first meeting, Edith's husband became quite ill. From time to time, I would stop by to visit. The more time I spent with her, the more evidence I saw of her mature faith. She lovingly cared for her life partner. I was drawn to her character and gracious spirit. Over time we developed a deep friendship that would continue long after her husband of sixty years passed away.

For many years Edith was a hairstylist on the town square, although she says *beautician* was the term used back in her day. The way she tells it, life was fairly simple then. She and her husband worked hard, loved their daughter, and lived contentedly. To this day, she has rarely traveled far from the place where she was reared.

Now ninety-four years old, Edith faces a recurrence of cancer. As I pull up a chair next to her comfortable recliner, I am inspired by the way she continues to find contentment amid the uncertainties of life. She talks glowingly about the flowering vines outside her door. She recalls a recent trip to the lake with her son-in-law. Then she says something I will forever remember. In a clear voice, she exclaims that everything she has ever wanted in life can be found right where she is.

Somehow I know it is true. Edith's life is centered on things that have lasting value—faith, family, friends.

Not long ago I began thinking of all the changes in the world that have occurred during Edith's lifetime. When she was young, there were only dirt roads and horse-drawn wagons in her farming community. Now there are luxury cars and six-lane highways. Innumerable electronic gadgets and medical advancements have evolved over these years. I was reminded that while others get sidetracked by a pursuit of things bigger and better, Edith keeps her eyes clearly focused on things that are eternal. She lives a life free of hypocrisy and selfish greed. There is much to be learned from her about finding contentment in one's own circumstances.

As I prepare to find the scripture verse to accompany Edith's story, I open my Bible and turn to the book of Timothy. There nestled in the pages is a needlepoint bookmark Edith made for me a while back. Two words stitched in blue: *be grateful*. Edith is living proof that contentment comes with a grateful heart. She lives a simple life worthy of her calling. There in a humble frame home lives one of the richest people I have ever known.
